



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Gregory Amick

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Gregory Amick, the appellant, by attorney Eric Feldman of Eric Feldman & Assoc. P.C. in Chicago; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **no change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$27,196
IMPR.: \$138,204
TOTAL: \$165,400

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2020 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of wood siding exterior construction with 2,792 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1991 but has a reported effective age of 1994. Features of the home include a basement, central air conditioning, 3.5 bathrooms, a fireplace and a 400 square foot garage. The property has a 10,210 square foot site and is located in Lake Zurich, Ela Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on five comparable sales with the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and located within .51 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables have sites that range in size from 10,020 to 13,860 square feet of land area. The comparables are improved with two-story dwellings of wood siding exterior construction ranging in size from 2,052 to 3,494 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1989 to

1993. One comparable has a concrete slab foundation and four comparables each have a basement. Each comparable has central air conditioning, 2.5 to 3.5 bathrooms, a fireplace and a garage ranging in size from 420 to 500 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from January to November 2019 for prices ranging from \$350,000 to \$551,170 or from \$141.68 to \$170.57 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's total assessment be reduced to \$146,263, which would reflect a market value of \$438,833 or \$157.18 per square foot of living area, including land, when using the statutory level of assessment of 33.33%.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$165,400. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$496,846 or \$177.95 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2020 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 33.29% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on five comparable sales with the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and located within .22 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables have sites that range in size from 9,940 to 12,640 square feet of land area. The comparables are improved with two-story dwellings of wood siding exterior construction ranging in size from 2,394 to 2,683 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built in 1990 or 1991. The comparables each have a basement, one of which is a walk-out. Each comparable has central air conditioning, 2.2 or 2.5 bathrooms, a fireplace and a garage ranging in size from 400 to 500 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from June 2019 to June 2020 for prices ranging from \$452,000 to \$499,000 or from \$175.18 to \$198.83 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains ten suggested comparable sales for the Board's consideration. The Board has given less weight to the appellant's comparables #1, #2 and #5 as well as board of review comparables #3 and #5 which differ from the subject in dwelling size. The board has also given less weight to the appellant's comparable #4 due to its dissimilar concrete slab foundation and to board of review comparable #1 due to its walk-out basement when compared to the subject.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be parties' remaining comparables, which are similar to the subject in location, dwelling size, design, age and some features, noting each has one less full bath. These comparables sold from July 2019 to November 2019 for prices ranging from \$436,500 to \$480,000 or from \$156.56 to \$178.90 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$496,846 or \$177.95 per

square foot of living area, including land, which falls above the range established by the best comparable sales in the record on an overall basis, but within the range on a price per square foot basis. After considering adjustments to the comparables for differences when compared to the subject in age, size and features, the Board finds no reduction in the subject's assessment is warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
