



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION  
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Bryce Anderson

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Bryce Anderson, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley, of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$23,023  
**IMPR.:** \$89,516  
**TOTAL:** \$112,539

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

**Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2020 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

**Findings of Fact**

The subject property consists of a 1-story dwelling of wood siding exterior construction with 1,925 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 2004. Features of the home include a crawl-space foundation, central air conditioning, two fireplaces, and a garage containing 523 square feet of building area. The property has an approximately 14,500 square foot site and is located in Fox Lake, Grant Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on five comparable sales located within 4.02 miles of the subject. The comparables consist of 1-story dwellings of frame exterior construction ranging in size from 1,714 to 2,426 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 2000 to 2007. Each dwelling has central air conditioning, a basement with four having finished area, and a garage ranging in size from 440 to 530 square feet of building area. Three comparables each

have a fireplace. The parcels range in size from 8,276 to 12,000 square feet of land area. The comparables sold from January 2018 to November 2019 for prices ranging from \$205,000 to \$272,500 or from \$99.90 to \$154.61 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduced assessment of \$80,200, for an estimated market value of \$240,624 or \$125.00 per square foot of living area, including land, when applying the statutory level of assessment of 33.33%.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$112,539. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$338,056 or \$175.61 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2020 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 33.29% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four comparable sales located within .45 of a mile of the subject and within the same assessment neighborhood as the subject. The comparables consist of 1-story, 1.5-story, or 2-story dwellings of wood siding exterior construction ranging in size from 1,636 to 2,208 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1926 to 2013, with comparables #3 and #4 having effective ages of 1950 and 1971, respectively. Each dwelling has central air conditioning and a garage ranging in size from 286 to 621 square feet of building area. Comparable #3 has a fireplace, three comparables each have a basement with two having finished area, and comparable #2 has a fully finished attic. The parcels range in size from 11,140 to 26,840 square feet of land area. The comparables sold from August 2019 to December 2020 for prices ranging from \$455,000 to \$535,000 or from \$217.60 to \$311.74 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

### **Conclusion of Law**

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales, or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted a total of nine comparable sales to support their respective positions before the Property Tax Appeal Board. The Board finds that neither party submitted comparables that are truly similar to the subject due to differences in age, location, design, foundation, dwelling size, and/or some features. Nevertheless, the Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables #2, #3, and #5 due to their more remote sales dates for valuation as of January 1, 2020. The Board also gives reduced weight to board of review comparables #2, #3, and #4 due to differences in age and/or finished attic amenity when compared to the subject.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be appellant's comparable sales #1 and #4 along with board of review comparable sale #1, which are relatively similar to the subject in age, design, dwelling size, and some features. These most similar comparables sold from October

2019 to August 2020 for prices ranging from \$205,000 to \$510,000 or from \$99.90 to \$272.73 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$338,056 or \$175.61 per square foot of living area, including land, which is within the range established by the best comparable sales in this record. Based on this evidence and after considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

**IMPORTANT NOTICE**

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
