



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Derek & Angela Allen, the appellants, by Jessica Hill-Magiera, Attorney at Law in Lake Zurich; and the DuPage County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **DuPage** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$57,150
IMPR.: \$174,030
TOTAL: \$231,180

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellants timely filed the appeal from a decision of the DuPage County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2020 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of frame and brick exterior construction with 3,115 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 2000. Features of the home include a basement, central air conditioning, one fireplace and a 437 square foot garage. The property has an approximately 9,000 square foot site and is located in Elmhurst, Addison Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on four comparable sales located within 0.22 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables are improved with two-story dwellings that range in size from 2,712 to 3,391 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1999 to 2004. Each comparable has a basement, central air conditioning, one fireplace and a garage ranging in

size from 399 to 440 square feet of building area. The properties sold from May 2019¹ to May 2020 for prices ranging from \$565,000 to \$627,000 or from \$179.89 to \$208.33 per square foot of living area, land included. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's total assessment be reduced to \$190,842 which reflects a market value of \$572,583 or \$183.81 per square foot of living area, land included, when applying the statutory level of assessment of 33.33%.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$231,180. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$692,156 or \$222.20 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2020 three-year average median level of assessment for DuPage County of 33.40% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

The board of review submitted property record cards for each of the appellants' comparables which disclosed the properties have site sizes ranging from 6,435 to 9,000 square feet of land area with frame or frame and brick exterior construction and that comparable #2 has finished basement area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on five comparable sales located in the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables have sites with either 7,800 or 9,000 square feet of land area and are improved with two-story dwellings of brick or frame and brick exterior construction that range in size from 2,626 to 3,556 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1996 to 2005. Each comparable has an unfinished basement, central air conditioning, one fireplace and a garage ranging in size from 418 to 733 square feet of building area. The properties sold from April 2017 to September 2019 for prices ranging from \$620,000 to \$812,500 or from \$217.33 to \$244.78 per square foot of living area, land included. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested the subject's assessment be confirmed.

In rebuttal, counsel for the appellants critiqued the board of review comparables arguing #1, #2, #4 and #5 are not comparable to the subject due to having a remote sale date, differing dwelling size and or a larger garage size when compared to the subject. Counsel submitted two rebuttal grids, one grid with both parties' comparables and one grid containing its suggested "best comparable sales for further clarity."

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales, or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

¹ The Board finds the appellants' comparable #3 sold in May 2019 as reported in its property record card which was submitted by the board of review.

The parties submitted nine comparable sales for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellants' comparable #2 which has finished basement area in contrast to the subject. The Board gives less weight to the board of review comparables #1, #2 and #5 which sold in 2017 or 2018, less proximate to the January 1, 2020 assessment date.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be appellants' comparables #1, #3 and #4 along with board of review comparables #3 and #4 which are more similar to the subject in location, age, design, dwelling size and other features. These comparables sold from May 2019 to May 2020 for prices ranging from \$565,000 to \$812,500 or from \$182.18 to \$228.49 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$692,156 or \$222.20 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls within the range established by the best comparable sales in this record. After considering appropriate adjustments to the comparables for differences from the subject, the Board finds the subject's assessment is justified and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
