

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Richard & Danuta Kot, the appellants, by attorney George N. Reveliotis, of Reveliotis Law, P.C. in Park Ridge; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *No Change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$5,557 **IMPR.:** \$14,884 **TOTAL:** \$20,441

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellants timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2020 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a 1-story dwelling of masonry exterior construction with 841 square feet of living area. The dwelling is approximately 69 years old. Features of the home include an unfinished basement, central air conditioning, and a 1.5-car garage. The property has a 5,850 square foot site and is located in Niles, Niles Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-02 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellants contend assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellants submitted information on seven equity comparables located in the same neighborhood code as the subject property, along with property characteristic printouts for the comparables. Based on the property printouts, the comparables are improved with 1-story, class 2-02 dwellings of frame, masonry, or frame and masonry

exterior construction ranging in size from 892 to 992 square feet of living area. The homes range in age from 65 to 70 years old. Six comparables each have a basement, two of which have finished area, and one comparable has a crawl space foundation. Two comparables each have central air conditioning, one comparable has one fireplace, and each comparable has from a 1-car to a 2-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$13,742 to \$15,443 or from \$15.41 to \$16.67 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellants requested that the subject's total improvement assessment be reduced.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$20,441. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$14,884 or \$17.70 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on four equity comparables located in the same neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables are improved with 1-story, class 2-02 dwellings of masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 834 to 895 square feet of living area. The homes are each 69 years old. Each comparable has a basement, two of which have finished area, and from a 1-car to a 2.5-car garage. Three comparables each have central air conditioning. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$16,040 to \$16,898 or from \$18.88 to \$19.65 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested the subject's assessment be confirmed.

Conclusion of Law

The appellants contend assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellants did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted eleven suggested equity comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be board of review comparables #1 and #3 which are more similar to the subject in location, design, age, and dwelling size with varying degree of similarity in other features. These comparables have improvement assessments of \$16,040 to \$16,659 or \$19.23 and \$19.65 per square foot of living area, respectively. The subject's improvement assessment of \$14,884 or \$17.70 per square foot of living area falls below the two best comparables in this record. The Board gives less weight to the remaining comparables due to differences in central air conditioning amenity, dwelling size and/or foundation type when compared to the subject. Based on this record and after considering adjustments to the two best comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds the appellants did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
