



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Adriano & Isa-Carla Tosi, the appellants, by attorney Robert Rosenfeld, of Robert H. Rosenfeld & Associates, LLC in Chicago; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds No Change in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$38,099
IMPR.: \$64,821
TOTAL: \$102,920

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellants timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2021 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a 2-story duplex of brick exterior construction with 2,128 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1952 and is approximately 69 years old. Features of the home include an unfinished basement and a garage containing 480 square feet of building area. The property has an approximately 9,270 square foot site that is located in Highland Park, Moraine Township, Lake County.

The appellants contend assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellants submitted information on four suggested equity comparables that are in the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and located within 0.41 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables are improved with 2-story duplex, conventional 2-story or multi-unit dwellings of brick or wood siding exterior construction that range in size from 1,816 to 2,358 square feet of living area that range in age from 71 to 108 years old. Each comparable has an unfinished basement and a garage ranging in size from 484 to 962 square feet of building area. Three comparables have central air conditioning. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$49,963 to \$67,461 or from \$26.41 to \$28.61 per square foot of living

area. Based on this evidence, the appellants requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$58,892 or \$27.67 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$102,920. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$64,821 or \$30.46 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on five suggested equity comparables that are in the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and located within 0.41 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables are improved with 1-story or 2-story dwellings of brick exterior construction ranging in size from 2,128 to 2,296 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1951 to 1963. Each comparable has a basement and a garage containing either 324 or 484 square feet of building area. Two comparables have central air conditioning. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$64,845 to \$77,757 or from \$30.47 to \$33.87 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayers contend assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellants did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted nine suggested comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board has given less weight to the appellants' comparables and the board of review comparables #4 and #5 due to their dissimilar age, smaller dwelling size or the feature of central air conditioning, an amenity the subject lacks.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be the board of review comparables #1, #2 and #3, which are relatively similar to the subject in location, design, dwelling size, age and features. These most similar comparables have improvement assessments of \$64,845 and \$66,495 or \$30.47 and \$31.19 per square foot of living area. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$64,821 or \$30.47 per square foot of living area, which falls below the best comparables in the record. Based on this record and after considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement assessment was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
