



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Sanjay Keshav

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Sanjay Keshav, the appellant, by attorney Gregory Riggs, of Tax Appeals Lake County in Lake Zurich; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$33,916
IMPR.: \$107,777
TOTAL: \$141,693

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2021 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property is improved with a 2-story dwelling of brick exterior construction with 1,976 square feet of living area. The dwelling was built in 2009. Features of the home include a lower level with finished area, central air conditioning, and a garage with 504 square feet of building area. The property has an approximately 1,429 square foot site and is located in Vernon Hills, Vernon Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on three comparable sales with the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and located within 0.08 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables have sites that range in size from 1,269 to 1,468 square feet of land area. The comparables are improved with 2-story or 3-story dwellings of brick and frame exterior construction with 1,963 or 1,976 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built in 2009 or

2019. One comparable has a lower level with finished area. Each comparable has central air conditioning and a garage ranging in size from 455 to 1,365 square feet of building area. The properties sold from June 2018 to January 2020 for prices ranging from \$395,000 to \$416,000 or from \$201.22 to \$210.53 per square foot of living area, land included. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's total assessment be reduced to \$138,320, which would reflect a market value of \$415,002 or \$210.02 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the statutory level of assessment of 33.33%.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$141,693. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$426,144 or \$215.66 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2021 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 33.25% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on three comparable sales with the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and located within 0.04 of a mile from the subject property. Comparable #2 has a site with 1,310 square feet of land area. The comparables are improved with 2-story dwellings of brick exterior construction ranging in size from 1,760 to 2,102 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built in 2009. Each comparable has a lower level with finished area, central air conditioning, and a garage ranging in size from 462 to 578 square feet of building area. Two comparables each have one fireplace. The properties sold from April to October 2021 for prices of \$425,000 or \$445,000 and ranging from \$211.70 to \$241.48 per square foot of living area, land included. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains seven suggested comparable sales for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables which lack lower levels, a feature of the subject, and/or have 2018 or 2019 sale dates which occurred less proximate in time to the subject's January 1, 2021 assessment date than the other comparables in this record.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be the board of review comparables which each sold proximate in time to the subject's assessment date at issue and are overall more similar to the subject in location, design, age, dwelling size, and most features. The properties sold from April to October 2021 for prices of \$425,000 or \$445,000 and ranging from \$211.70 to \$241.48 per square foot of living area, land included. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$426,144 or \$215.66 per square foot of living area, land included, which falls within the range established by the best comparable sales in the record. Based on the record, the Board finds a reduction in the subject's estimated market value as reflected by its assessment is not warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
