



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION  
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Kellan Schuh

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Kellan Schuh, the appellant, by attorney Gregory Riggs, of Tax Appeals Lake County in Lake Zurich; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds No Change in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$25,833  
**IMPR.:** \$106,886  
**TOTAL:** \$132,719

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

**Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2021 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

**Findings of Fact**

The subject property consists of a 2-story dwelling of vinyl siding exterior construction with 3,836 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 2005. Features of the home include a basement with finished area, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a garage with 546 square feet of building area. The property has a 9,748 square foot site and is located in Wauconda, Wauconda Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on four suggested equity comparables located within the same assessment neighborhood as the subject property and within 0.73 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables are improved with 2-story dwellings of vinyl siding or brick and vinyl siding exterior construction that range in size from 3,748 to 4,270 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 2004 to 2007. Each comparable has a basement, two with finished area, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a garage ranging in size from 546 to 764 square feet of building area. Comparable #4 has an inground swimming pool. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$71,396 to \$114,263 or from \$18.61 to

\$26.76 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$77,490 or \$20.20 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$132,719. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$106,886 or \$27.86 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted the subject's property record card and a grid analysis of five suggested equity comparables located within the same assessment neighborhood as the subject property and within 0.38 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables are improved with 2-story dwellings of vinyl siding or brick and vinyl siding exterior construction each containing 3,836 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built in 2004 and 2005. Each comparable has a basement, three with finished area, central air conditioning and a garage containing 546 square feet of building area. Four comparables each have a fireplace. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$101,890 to \$110,055 or from \$26.56 to \$28.69 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

### **Conclusion of Law**

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted nine suggested comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board gave less weight to the appellant's comparables #1 and #4 along with the board of review comparables #1 and #3 due to their unfinished basement foundations when compared to the subject's finished basement.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity are the appellant's comparables #2 and #3 along with the board of review comparables #2, #4 and #5. These comparables are similar to the subject in location, design, dwelling size, age and features. They have improvement assessments ranging from \$71,396 to \$110,055 or from \$18.61 to \$28.69 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$106,886 or \$27.86 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the best comparables in the record. Based on this record, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

**IMPORTANT NOTICE**

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
