



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Daniel Gandor

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Daniel Gandor, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **no change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$42,328
IMPR.: \$191,556
TOTAL: \$233,884

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2021 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of brick exterior construction with 4,066 square feet of living area.¹ The dwelling was constructed in 2016. Features of the home include a basement, central air conditioning, a fireplace, and an attached garage containing 842 square feet of building area. The property has an approximately 15,168 square foot site and is located in Lake Zurich, Ela Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on four comparable sales that have the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and are located within .61 of a mile from the subject property.

¹ The parties differ as to the size of the subject dwelling and the subject's site. The Board finds the best evidence of size is found in the subject's property record card provided by the board of review, which contains a schematic diagram and dimensions of the subject dwelling.

The comparables have sites that range in size from 15,056 to 15,280 square feet of land area and are improved with two-story dwellings of brick exterior construction ranging in size from 3,896 to 4,510 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 2003 to 2006. The comparables each have a basement, three of which are look-outs. Each comparable has central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and an attached garage ranging in size from 424 to 778 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from June 2020 to January 2021 for prices ranging from \$595,000 to \$615,000 or from \$135.25 to \$152.72 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$233,884. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$703,411 or \$173.00 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2021 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 33.25% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on five comparable sales that have the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and are located within .63 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables have sites that range in size from 15,010 to 20,040 square feet of land area. The comparables are improved with two-story dwellings of brick exterior construction ranging in size from 3,451 to 4,563 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 2006 to 2015. Each comparable has a basement, central air conditioning, one to three fireplaces and an attached garage ranging in size from 693 to 937 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from August 2019 to August 2021 for prices ranging from \$608,000 to \$800,000 or from \$154.51 to \$202.84 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted a total of nine comparable sales for the Board's consideration. The Board has given less weight to the appellant's comparables #1, #2 and #3, as well as board of review comparables #2 and #4 due to differences from the subject in dwelling size or age. The Board has also given less weight to board of review comparable #3 as its sale date occurred less proximate in time to the assessment date at issue than the other sales in the record.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be the appellant's comparable #4, along with board of review comparables #1 and #5, which sold more proximate in time to the assessment date at issue and are similar to the subject in location, dwelling size, design, age and some features. These most similar comparables sold from October 2020 to July 2021 for prices

ranging from \$595,000 to \$726,000 or from \$152.72 to \$177.26 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$703,411 or \$173.00 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls within the range established by the best comparable sales in this record. Based on this evidence and after considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences from the subject, the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
