

# FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Ronald Fiocchi DOCKET NO.: 21-04557.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 16-28-117-008

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Ronald Fiocchi, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley, of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *no change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$51,480 **IMPR.:** \$121,472 **TOTAL:** \$172,952

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

# **Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2021 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

#### **Findings of Fact**

The subject property consists of a split-level dwelling of brick and wood siding exterior construction with 1,775 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1965. Features of the home include central air conditioning, a fireplace and an attached 600 square foot garage. The property has an approximately 10,120 square foot site and is located in Deerfield, West Deerfield Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on three comparable sales that are located within .42 of a mile from the subject. The comparables have sites with 9,901 or 10,123 square feet of land area that are improved with what are described as 1-story dwellings ranging in size from 1,572 to 1,925 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1957 to 1963. The comparables have a fireplace and a garage ranging in size from 462 to 550 square feet of building area. Two

comparables have central air conditioning. The comparables sold in April 2020 or March 2021 for prices ranging from \$370,000 to \$565,000 or from \$221.69 to \$293.51 per square foot of living area, including land.

Based on this evidence the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$172,952. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$520,156 or \$293.05 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2021 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 33.25% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on five comparable sales that are located within .45 of a mile from the subject. The board of review's comparables #3 and #4, are the same properties as the appellant's comparables #3 and #2, respectively. However, the board of review reports these comparables sold a second time later in 2021. The comparables have sites ranging in size from 8,770 to 10,120 square feet of land area. The comparables are improved with what are described as 1-story dwellings of brick or brick and wood siding exterior construction ranging in size from 1,509 to 1,925 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1956 to 1959. Four comparables have central air conditioning, four comparables each have a fireplace, and each comparable has an attached garage ranging in size from 252 to 552 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from June to November 2021 for prices ranging from \$488,000 to \$590,000 or from \$300.31 to \$372.14 per square foot of living area, including land.

Based on this evidence the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

#### **Conclusion of Law**

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted a total of six comparable properties for the Board's consideration, two of which were submitted by both parties, but the parties report differing sale dates and prices. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparable #3, due to its lack of central air conditioning when compared to the subject. The Board also gives less weight to the board of review's comparable #3, which is one of the parties' common comparables but has a different sale date and price, due to its lack of central air conditioning when compared to the subject. The Board finds the parties' remaining comparables, which includes one of the parties' common comparables but has a different sale date and price, have varying degrees of similarity to the subject. The best comparables sold from April 2020 to November 2021 for prices ranging from \$370,000 to \$585,000 or from \$221.69 to \$372.14 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$520,156 or \$293.05 per square foot of living

area, including land, which falls within the range established by the best comparables in the record. After considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds the subject's estimated market value as reflected by its assessment is supported. Based on this evidence the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

# **IMPORTANT NOTICE**

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
