



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION  
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Michael Bond, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley, of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **no change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$13,940  
**IMPR.:** \$88,860  
**TOTAL:** \$102,800

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

**Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2021 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

**Findings of Fact**

The subject property consists of a 2-story dwelling with vinyl siding exterior construction containing 2,294 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1994. Features of the home include a basement, that has finished area, central air conditioning, a fireplace, an attached 420 square foot garage and a gazebo. The property has an approximately 8,450 square foot site and is located in Grayslake, Avon Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on 12 comparable properties that are located from .05 to .36 of a mile from the subject. The comparables are improved with 2-story dwellings containing 2,294 or 2,344 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1991 to 1994. The comparables have unfinished basements, central air conditioning and a 420 or a 440 square foot garage. Eight comparables each have a fireplace.

The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$78,250 to \$84,684 or from \$33.38 to \$36.13 per square foot of living area.

Based on this evidence the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's improvement assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$102,800. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$88,860 or \$38.74 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on five comparable properties that are located from .25 of a mile to 1.02 miles from the subject. The comparables are improved with 2-story dwellings with vinyl exterior construction containing 2,294 or 2,344 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1992 to 1995. The comparables have basements, each of which have finished area, central air conditioning, a fireplace and an attached 400 or 420 square foot garage. One comparable has a frame utility shed and one comparable has a swimming pool. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$89,211 to \$95,590 or from \$38.89 to \$40.78 per square foot of living area.

Based on this evidence the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

### **Conclusion of Law**

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted a total of 17 comparable properties for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables due to their lack of finished basement area, when compared to the subject. The Board also gives less weight to the board of review's comparables #2 and #4, due to their swimming pool feature and/or their location over a mile from the subject. The Board finds the board of review's remaining comparables are similar to the subject in location, style, age, size and features. The best comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$89,278 to \$92,745 or from \$38.92 to \$40.43 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$88,860 or \$38.74 per square foot of living area falls below the range established by the best comparables in the record. After considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds the subject's improvement assessment is well supported. Based on this record, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement is inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

**IMPORTANT NOTICE**

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
