

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Eric Meyer, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest, and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds <u>No Change</u> in the assessment of the property as established by the Lake County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND:	\$104,839
IMPR.:	\$48,823
TOTAL:	\$153,662

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2021 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property is improved with a one-story dwelling of frame construction containing 1,736 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1950. Features of the home include a crawl space foundation, central air conditioning, and an attached garage with 400 square feet of building area. The property has an 8,886 square foot site located in Libertyville, Libertyville Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the land as the basis of the appeal. The appellant is not contesting the improvement assessment. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on twelve equity comparables each improved with a single-family dwelling. The comparables have the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject property and are located from .03 to .30 miles from the subject property. The comparables have sites ranging in size from 8,469 to 9,194 square feet of land area. These properties have land

assessments ranging from \$80,338 to \$102,560 of from \$9.29 to \$11.57 per square foot of land area. The appellant requested the subject's land assessment be reduced to \$95,258.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$153,662. The subject property has a land assessment of \$104,839 or \$11.80 per square foot of land area. In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on five equity comparables each improved with a single-family dwelling. The comparable have the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and are located from .02 to .09 miles from the subject property. One comparable is located along the same street and within one block of the subject property. The comparables range in size from 7,471 to 8,713 square feet of land area and have land assessments of ranging from \$91,164 to \$103,319 or from \$11.51 to \$12.60 per square foot of land area.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains seventeen comparables submitted by the parties to support their respective positions. The comparables have the same neighborhood assessment code as the subject property and have varying degrees of similarity to the subject in land area. The Board gives less weight to appellant's comparable #1 as the land assessment appears to be an outlier relative to the remaining comparables in this record. The sixteen remaining properties have land assessments ranging from \$91,164 to \$103,319 or from \$10.31 to \$12.60 per square foot of land area. Board of review comparable #3 is located along the same street and within one block of the subject property. This comparable has a land assessment of \$103,319 or \$12.60 per square foot of land area falls slightly above the overall range but within the range established by the best comparables in this record on a per square foot of land area basis. Based on this record the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's land was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND</u> <u>EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
