

FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD

APPELLANT: Tejpal Matharu DOCKET NO.: 21-04925.001-R-1 PARCEL NO.: 15-07-214-001

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Tejpal Matharu, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley, of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Lake Forest; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds *No Change* in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$25,085 **IMPR.:** \$116,527 **TOTAL:** \$141,612

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2021 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a 2-story dwelling of wood siding exterior construction with 2,677 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1993. Features of the home include a basement with finished area, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a 420 square foot garage. The property has an approximately 13,720 square foot site and is located in Vernon Hills, Vernon Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on four comparable sales located in the same neighborhood code as the subject and within 0.60 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables have sites ranging from 7,524 to 14,140 square feet of land area. The comparables are improved with 2-story dwellings of frame exterior construction containing either 2,611 or 2,643 square feet of living area that were built in 1989 or 1990. The appellant reported that each comparable has a basement with finished area, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a garage containing either 420 or 497 square feet of building area. Comparables #1, #2 and #4 sold from February to

August 2020 for prices ranging from \$345,000 to \$425,000 or from \$132.13 to \$160.80 per square foot of living area, including land. No sale data was provided for comparable #3. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$141,612. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$425,901 or \$159.10 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 2021 three-year average median level of assessment for Lake County of 33.25% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on five comparable sales located in the same neighborhood code as the subject and within 0.44 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables have sites that range in size from 11,030 to 12,610 square feet of land area. The comparables are improved with 1-story¹ or 2-story dwellings of wood siding exterior construction that range in size from 2,611 to 2,677 square feet of living area and were built from 1989 to 1993. Each comparable has a basement, two with finished area, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a garage with either 420 or 497 square feet of building area. The comparables sold from April 2020 to December 2021 for prices ranging from \$425,000 to \$485,000 or from \$160.80 to \$183.50 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains nine suggested comparable sales for the Board's consideration. The Board has given less weight to the appellant's comparables #1, #2 and #3 due to their lack of sales data or smaller lot sizes when compared to the subject. The Board has given reduced weight to the board of review comparables #1, #3 and #4 for their unfinished basements when compared to the subject's finished basement.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be the appellant's comparable #4 along with the board of review comparables #2 and #5. The Board finds that these comparables are relatively similar to the subject in location, design, age, dwelling size, and features. The comparables sold from May 2020 to December 2021 for prices ranging from \$425,000 to \$485,000 or from \$160.80 to \$183.50 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$425,901 or \$159.10 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls within the range established by the best comparable sales on an

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¹ Although comparable #1 is describe as a 1-story dwelling, the property is described to have 899 square feet of ground floor living area and 2,611 square feet of above ground living area indicating that the subject is a part 2-story and part 1-story dwelling.

overall market value basis but below the range of the best comparable sales on a price per square foot basis. Based on this record and after considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds no reduction in the subject's assessment is warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A <u>PETITION AND EVIDENCE</u> WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
