



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION  
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: James & Laura Drogosz

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are James & Laura Drogosz, the appellants, by Jessica Hill-Magiera, Attorney at Law in Lake Zurich; and the DuPage County Board of Review.<sup>1</sup>

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **A Reduction** in the assessment of the property as established by the **DuPage** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$51,380  
**IMPR.:** \$118,440  
**TOTAL:** \$169,820

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

**Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellants timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2021 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

**Findings of Fact**

The subject property is improved with a 2-story dwelling of brick construction with 3,588 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1991. Features of the home include a basement, central air conditioning, one fireplace and a garage with 528 square feet of building area. The property is located in Addison, Addison Township, DuPage County.

The appellants contend overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellants submitted information on four comparable sales located within .13 of a mile from the subject. These comparables are described as 2-story dwellings built from 1988 to 1991 and range in size from 3,280 to 3,627 square feet of living area. Each comparable has a basement, central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and a garage ranging in size from 473 to 506

square feet of building area. The comparables sold from June 2020 to April 2021 for prices ranging from \$382,000 to \$515,000 or from \$111.70 to \$149.67 per square foot of living area, land included. Based on this evidence, the appellants requested a reduction in the subject's total assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$194,070. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$580,526 or \$161.80 per square foot of living area, land included, when using the 20210 three-year average median level of assessment for DuPage County of 33.43% as determined by the Illinois Department of Revenue.

In response to the appellants' evidence, the board of review submitted evidence that disclosed appellants' comparable #2 sold for \$385,000 or \$112.57 per square foot of living area, including land, instead of \$382,000 which was not refuted the appellant.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information through the township assessor on four comparable sales with same assessment neighborhood code as the subject. The comparables are described as 2-story dwellings of brick or brick and frame exterior construction built in 1988 or 1989. The dwellings range in size from 3,306 to 3,766 square feet of living area. The comparables each have a basement, central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces and a garage ranging in size from 484 to 792 square feet of building area. These comparables sold from February 2018 to November 2019 for prices ranging from \$475,000 to \$710,000 or from \$143.68 to \$188.53 per square foot of living area, land included. The board of review also provided a location map of both parties' comparable sales in relation to the subject property, property record cards and exterior photographs. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

In written rebuttal, counsel for the appellants contended that the board of review comparables are not comparable due to their remote sale dates in 2018 and 2019. In a rebuttal grid analysis, counsel suggested that the appellants' comparables are the best comparable sales in the record and contended the subject's assessment should be reduced.

### **Conclusion of Law**

The appellants contend the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales or construction costs. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellants met this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is warranted.

The Board finds the parties submitted eight comparables sales to support their respective positions. The Board gives less weight to the board of review comparables as their 2018 and 2019 sale dates are less proximate in time to the January 1, 2021 assessment date than the appellants' comparables.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be appellants' comparables which sold more proximate in time to the assessment date at issue and are similar to the subject in location, age, dwelling size and some features. These comparables sold from June 2020 to April 2021 for prices ranging from \$385,000 to \$515,000 or from \$112.57 to \$149.67 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$580,526 or \$161.80 per square foot of living area, including land, which falls above the range established by the best comparables sales in this record both on overall market value and price per square foot. Based on this evidence and after considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

**IMPORTANT NOTICE**

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
