



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Farhan Yasin

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Farhan Yasin, the appellant, by attorney Noah J. Schmidt, of Schmidt Salzman & Moran, Ltd. in Chicago, and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$15,930
IMPR.: \$134,414
TOTAL: \$150,344

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2021 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of frame exterior construction with 4,155 square feet of living area. The dwelling is approximately 1 year old. Features of the home include a full basement with a formal recreation room, 2½ bathrooms, central air conditioning, three fireplaces, and a two-car garage. The property has an 8,850 square foot site and is located in Winnetka, New Trier Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-08 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity concerning the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on five equity comparables¹ located in the same neighborhood code as the subject. The appellant supplied property characteristics printouts with additional data concerning basement, basement finish and

half-bath features which have been added for clarity. The comparables consist of class 2-08 two-story dwellings of frame or masonry exterior construction. The dwellings range in age from 4 to 26 years old and range in size from 3,872 to 4,540 square feet of living area. The comparables have full basements, four of which have formal recreation rooms. The homes have 2 or 4 bathrooms along with 1 or 2 half-baths and central air conditioning. Four comparables have from one to three fireplaces and four comparables have from a 1-car to a 2.5-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$103,281 to \$114,233 or from \$25.16 to \$27.47 per square foot of living area.

Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduced improvement assessment of \$111,437 or \$26.82 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$150,344. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$134,414 or \$32.35 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on three equity comparables located in the same neighborhood code and either the same block or subarea of the subject. The comparables consist of class 2-08 two-story dwellings of frame exterior construction that are 1 to 7 years old. The homes range in size from 3,869 to 4,087 square feet of living area. Each comparable has a full basement with a formal recreation room, 2½ or 5½ bathrooms, central air conditioning, two fireplaces and a two-car garage. Comparable #3 has "other improvements" which are not further defined in the record. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$141,487 to \$150,444 or from \$35.47 to \$36.81 per square foot of living area.

Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted a total of eight equity comparables to support their respective positions before the Property Tax Appeal Board. The Board has given reduced weight to the appellant's comparables #1, #3, #4 and #5, due to differences in age which range from 12 to 26 years old in comparison to the 1 year old subject dwelling.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity in the record are appellant's comparable #2 along with the board of review comparables, which are each relatively similar to the subject in location, age, dwelling size, foundation type, finished basement, and garage capacity.

Adjustments for differences in bathroom count, dwelling size, and fireplace count are necessary when compared to the subject to make these comparables more equivalent to the subject. These comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$103,281 to \$150,444 or from \$26.16 to \$36.81 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$134,414 or \$32.35 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the best comparables in this record both in terms of overall improvement assessment and on a per-square-foot of living area basis. Furthermore, the subject's assessment appears well-supported by board of review comparable #2 when considering the upward adjustment for an additional fireplace when compared to the subject.

The constitutional provision for uniformity of taxation and valuation does not require mathematical equality. The requirement is satisfied if the intent is evident to adjust the taxation burden with a reasonable degree of uniformity and if such is the effect of the statute enacted by the General Assembly establishing the method of assessing real property in its general operation. A practical uniformity, rather than an absolute one, is the test. Apex Motor Fuel Co. v. Barrett, 20 Ill. 2d 395 (1960). Although the comparables presented by the parties disclosed that properties located in the same area are not assessed at identical levels, all that the constitution requires is a practical uniformity which appears to exist on the basis of the evidence.

Based on this record and after considering appropriate adjustments to the best comparables for differences when compared to the subject property, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
