



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Yvette Wilson, the appellant, by Jessica Hill-Magiera, Attorney at Law in Lake Zurich; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **a reduction** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$711
IMPR.: \$2,775
TOTAL: \$3,486

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2021 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a 1-story townhome of frame construction with 1,162 square feet of living area which was built in 1980 and is approximately 41 years old. The dwelling was built on a concrete slab foundation and features one bathroom, central air conditioning, and a 1-car garage. The property has an 862 square foot site and is located in Country Club Hills, Rich Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-95 property¹ under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on eight equity comparables located from .19 to .22 of a mile from the subject, and within the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables consist of 1-story class 2-95 townhomes of frame construction each containing 1,162 square feet of living area and each one

being built in either 1978 or 1979. The comparables are each built on a concrete slab foundation, and each one features one bathroom, central air conditioning, and a 1-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$1,820 to \$2,916 or from \$1.57 to \$2.51 per square foot of living area. The appellant also submitted a brief requesting a reduction to the subject's improvement assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$4,570. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$3,859 or \$3.32 per square foot of living area. In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on eight equity comparables located within the "same block" as the subject and within the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables consist of 1-story class 2-95 townhomes of frame construction each containing 1,162 square feet of living area and each being 41 years old. Each comparable features one bathroom, concrete slab foundation, central air conditioning, and a 1-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$3,036 to \$3,192 or from \$2.61 to \$2.75 per square foot of living area.

In rebuttal, the appellant's counsel noted that the board of review did not critique appellant's comparables and, further, that the board of review's own comparables support a reduction to the subject's improvement assessment based on the principle of uniformity.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant met this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is warranted.

The parties submitted a total of sixteen equity comparables in support of their positions before the Property Tax Appeal Board. The Board gives less weight to appellant's comparable #1 which appears to be an outlier based on its significantly lower improvement assessment relative to the remaining comparables in the record. The Board finds the remaining fifteen comparables in this record to be proximate in location to the subject, as well as overall virtually identical in age, design/class, dwelling size, bathroom count, foundation, and features. These fifteen comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$2,675 to \$3,192 or from \$2.30 to \$2.75 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$3,859 or \$3.32 per square foot of living area is above the range established by the best equity comparables in this record both in terms of overall improvement assessment and on a per square foot of living area basis. Consequently, the Board finds that the subject's improvement is inequitably assessed and a reduction commensurate with the appellant's request is warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
