



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Lisa Wong, the appellant, by attorney Timothy C. Jacobs, of Kovitz Shifrin Nesbit in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$12,650
IMPR.: \$29,187
TOTAL: \$41,837

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2021 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property is improved with a 1-story dwelling of masonry exterior construction that contains 1,185 square feet of living area. The dwelling is approximately 38 years old. Features of the property include a full basement with finished area, central air conditioning, and 2 bathrooms. The property has a 2,875 square foot site located in Chicago, South Chicago Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-03 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends inequity regarding the improvement assessment as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on six comparables that are located within the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject. Three comparables are also located within the same block and the same street as the subject. The comparables consist of class 2-03 dwellings of masonry exterior construction that range in size from 1,050 to

1,260 square feet of living area. The dwellings are from 78 to 143 years old. The dwellings each have a full basement, but no data was provided if the basements have finished area. Each comparable has 1 bathroom, and four comparables each have a 2-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$14,370 to \$21,350 or from \$11.40 to \$17.85 per square foot of living area. The appellant requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$16,507.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$41,837. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$29,187 or \$24.63 per square foot of living area. In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four comparables that are located within the same assessment neighborhood code and along the same street as the subject. The comparables are also located within the same block or approximately ¼ of a mile from the subject. The comparables consist of class 2-03, 1-story dwellings of masonry exterior construction that range in size from 1,100 to 1,200 square feet of living area. The dwellings are from 38 to 59 years old. The homes each have a full basement, one of which has finished area, and either 1, 2 or 2.5 bathrooms. Two comparables each have central air conditioning. Three comparables each have a 2-car garage. The board of review commented the "Subject sold on 08/01/2018 for \$385,000 at arms length." The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$27,988 to \$34,350 or from \$25.44 to \$28.63 per square foot of living area.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted information on ten equity comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to appellant's comparables and the board of review comparable #3 due to their significantly older aged dwellings when compared to the subject.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be the board of review comparables #1, #2 and #4. These comparables are more similar to the subject in location, age, dwelling size, and/or foundation type, but still require adjustments for varying degrees of similarity to the subject in other features. These three comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$31,332 to \$34,350 or from \$27.01 to \$28.63 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$29,187 or \$24.63 per square foot of living area falls below the range established by the best comparables in this record. After considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences from the subject, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
