



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Matthew Hyser, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley, of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Hawthorn Woods, and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$66,546
IMPR.: \$168,229
TOTAL: \$234,775

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2022 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of brick and frame exterior construction with 3,286 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1985. Features of the home include a partial basement with finished area, central air conditioning, a fireplace and a 462 square foot garage. The property is located in Deerfield, West Deerfield Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on 12 equity comparables improved with two-story dwellings that range in size from 3,303 to 3,397 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1984 to 1986, with comparable #3 having an effective age of 1988. Each comparable has a basement, central air conditioning, a fireplace, and a garage ranging in size from 420 to 567 square feet of building area. The comparables have the

same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and are located from 0.03 to 0.28 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$138,095 to \$149,757 or from \$41.24 to \$44.78 per square foot of living area. The appellant requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$145,077.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$234,775. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$168,229 or \$51.20 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on five equity comparables improved with two-story dwellings of brick or frame and brick exterior construction that range in size from 2,862 to 3,342 square feet of living area. The homes were built in either 1985 or 1986. Each comparable has a full or partial basement with four having finished area, central air conditioning, a fireplace, and a garage ranging in size from 400 to 462 square feet of building area. Comparable #3 also has an inground swimming pool. The comparables have the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and are located from 0.03 to 0.23 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$148,557 to \$170,187 or from \$50.26 to \$53.00 per square foot of living area.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The record contains 17 equity comparables submitted by the parties to support their respective positions. The Board gives less weight to the board of review's comparables #1 and #3 due to differences from the subject dwelling in size and types of amenities. Board of review comparable #1 is 13% smaller than the subject dwelling and comparable #3 has an inground swimming pool, unlike the subject. The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be the appellant's comparables and the board of review's comparables #2, #4, and #5, which are most similar in terms of age, size, types of amenities, and location. These comparables had improvement assessments that ranged from \$138,095 to \$170,187 or from \$41.24 to \$53.00 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$168,229 or \$51.20 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the best comparables in this record. Based on this record the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
