



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION  
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Matthew Checkon, the appellant, by attorney Ronald Kingsley, of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Hawthorn Woods; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$17,127  
**IMPR.:** \$117,036  
**TOTAL:** \$134,163

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

**Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2022 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

**Findings of Fact**

The subject property consists of a 2-story dwelling of wood siding exterior construction with 3,735 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 2004. Features of the home include an unfinished basement, central air conditioning, one fireplace, and a 744 square foot garage. The property has an approximately 9,375 square foot site and is located in Lake Villa, Warren Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement assessment as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on twelve equity comparables that are located in the subject's assessment neighborhood code, eleven of which are reported to be located within 0.23 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables are improved with 2-story dwellings ranging in size from 3,639 to 3,895 square feet of living area. The homes were built in either 2003 or 2004. Each comparable is reported to

have an unfinished basement, central air conditioning, and a garage ranging in size from 420 to 792 square feet of building area. Ten comparables each have one fireplace. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$87,233 to \$116,425 or from \$23.93 to \$30.67 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$107,381 or \$28.75 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$134,163. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$117,036 or \$31.33 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on five equity comparables that are located in the subject's assessment neighborhood code and within 0.24 of a mile from the subject property. The comparables are improved with 2-story dwellings of wood siding exterior construction ranging in size from 3,683 to 3,757 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 2003 to 2005. The comparables each have a basement, three of which have finished area. Each comparable has central air conditioning, one or two fireplaces, and a garage ranging in size from 736 to 766 square feet of building area. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$116,310 to \$125,269 or from \$30.96 to \$34.01 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested the subject's assessment be confirmed.

### **Conclusion of Law**

The appellant contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments, for the assessment year in question, of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted seventeen equity comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to board of review comparables #1, #4, and #5 which are reported to have basement finish, a feature the subject lacks.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be parties' remaining comparables which are similar to the subject in location, design, age, dwelling size, and other features. The three remaining comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$87,233 to \$117,166 or from \$23.93 to \$31.38 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$117,036 or \$31.33 per square foot of living area falls within the range established by the best comparables in this record. Based on this record and after considering appropriate adjustments to the best comparables for differences from the subject, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

**IMPORTANT NOTICE**

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
