



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Andrzej Tylus

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Andrzej Tylus, the appellant, by attorney Andrew S. Dziuk of Andrew Dziuk, Esq. in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds a reduction in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$12,348
IMPR.: \$14,635
TOTAL: \$26,983

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2022 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a 1.5-story dwelling of masonry exterior construction with 1,449 square feet of living area.¹ The dwelling is approximately 93 years old. The home features an unfinished basement, one full bathroom and a two-car garage. The property has a 4,410 square foot site and is located in Chicago, Jefferson Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-03 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on five equity comparables that have the same assessment neighborhood code and property classification code

as the subject, one of which is located along the same street as the subject. The comparables are improved with dwellings of masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 1,377 to 1,711 square feet of living area. The dwellings are from 69 to 116 years old. The comparables each have a full or partial basement. No data was provided regarding basement finish, if any for the comparables. Each comparable has one or two full bathrooms, two comparables each have an additional half bathroom and four comparables each have a two-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$13,264 to \$15,888 or from \$7.75 to \$10.40 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$11,229 or \$7.75 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$31,000. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$18,652 or \$12.87 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four equity comparables that have the same assessment neighborhood code and property classification code as the subject. The comparables are located within the same block as the subject property, one of which is also along the same street as the subject. The comparables are improved with 1.5-story dwellings of masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 1,231 to 1,458 square feet of living area. The dwellings are from 72 to 93 years old. The comparables each have a full basement that is finished with a formal recreation room, one full bathroom and from a one-car to a two-car garage. Two comparables each have an additional half bathroom and three comparables have central air conditioning. The comparables have improvement assessments of \$18,887 and \$21,416 or from \$12.95 to \$15.34 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant met this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is warranted.

The parties submitted nine comparable properties for the Board's consideration. The Board has given less weight to the appellant's comparables #1, #3 and #4 which differ from the subject dwelling in age and/or size. Additionally, the appellant's comparable #1 has no garage, a feature of the subject. The Board has given reduced weight to the four comparables submitted by the board of review, which have central air conditioning, unlike the subject and/or they differ from the subject dwelling in age.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be the appellant's comparables #1 and #5, which have the same assessment neighborhood code and property classification code as the subject. These two comparables are overall more similar to the subject dwelling in size, age and

some features. These two comparables have improvement assessments of \$13,699 and \$14,324 or \$9.79 and \$10.40 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$18,652 or \$12.87 per square foot of living area is greater than the two best comparables in this record. After considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences from the subject, the Board finds the subject's improvement assessment is excessive. Therefore, based on this record the Board finds a reduction in the subject's improvement assessment is justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
