



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: James Brocks

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are James Brocks, the appellant, by attorney Gregory Riggs, of Tax Appeals Lake County in Lake Zurich; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$29,138
IMPR.: \$73,318
TOTAL: \$102,456

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2023 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a two-story dwelling of brick exterior construction with 2,336 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1978 and is approximately 45 years old. Features of the home include a concrete slab foundation, central air conditioning, a fireplace, and a garage containing 506 square feet of building area. The property has a 47,170 square foot site and is located in Round Lake Beach, Avon Township, Lake County.

The appellant contends overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on four comparable sales located from .81 of a mile to 2.04 miles from the subject and within the subject's assessment neighborhood. The comparables consist of two-story dwellings of frame exterior construction ranging in size from 1,728 to 2,250 square feet of living area. The homes were built from 1945 to 2000, with comparable #3 having an effective age of 1983. Each dwelling has central air conditioning, two comparables each have

one or two fireplaces, three comparables have crawl-space foundations, one comparable has a basement with finished area, and three comparables each have a garage ranging in size from 400 to 864 square feet of building area. The parcels range in size from 5,590 to 10,010 square feet of land area. The comparables sold from February 2020 to January 2023 for prices ranging from \$86,000 to \$225,000 or from \$41.67 to \$100.00 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested a reduced assessment of \$85,325, for an estimated market value of \$256,001 or \$109.59 per square foot of living area, including land, when applying the statutory level of assessment of 33.33%.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$102,456. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$307,399 or \$131.59 per square foot of living area, land included, when applying the statutory level of assessment of 33.33%.¹

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four comparable sales located within .98 of a mile of the subject and within the subject's assessment neighborhood. The comparables consist of two-story dwellings of vinyl siding exterior construction ranging in size from 1,510 to 2,432 square feet of living area. The dwellings are 31 to 123 years old. Each dwelling has a basement, two of which have finished area. Three comparables have central air conditioning and a fireplace. Three comparables each have a garage ranging in size from 380 to 520 square feet of building area. The parcels range in size from 4,400 to 14,662 square feet of land area. The comparables sold from May 2022 to February 2023 for prices ranging from \$285,000 to \$325,000 or from \$133.63 to \$198.61 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill. Admin. Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales, or construction costs. 86 Ill. Admin. Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted a total of eight comparable sales to support their respective positions before the Property Tax Appeal Board. The Board finds the parties' comparables are not truly similar to the subject due to differences in age, location, dwelling size, foundation, and/or features. Nevertheless, the Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables #2 through #4, which sold less proximate to the January 1, 2023 assessment date at issue in this appeal.

¹ Procedural rule Sec. 1910.50(c)(1) provides that in all counties other than Cook, the three-year county wide assessment level as certified by the Department of Revenue will be considered. 86 Ill. Admin. Code §1910.50(c)(1). Prior to the drafting of this decision, the Department of Revenue has yet to publish figures for tax year 2023.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be the appellant's comparable sale #1 and the board of review comparable sales, which have varying degrees of similarity to the subject. These comparables sold for prices ranging from \$142,000 to \$325,000 or from \$82.18 to \$198.61 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$307,399 or \$131.59 per square foot of living area, including land, which is within the range established by the best comparable sales in this record. Based on this evidence and after considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
