



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION  
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Susan and Terrence Riordan

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Susan and Terrence Riordan, the appellants, by attorney Ronald Kingsley, of Lake County Real Estate Tax Appeal, LLC in Hawthorn Woods; and the Lake County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Lake** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

**LAND:** \$42,580  
**IMPR.:** \$165,825  
**TOTAL:** \$208,405

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

**Statement of Jurisdiction**

The appellants timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Lake County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2023 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

**Findings of Fact**

The subject property consists of a 1.5-story dwelling of brick and frame exterior construction with 3,340 square feet of living area. The dwelling was constructed in 1929 and has an effective age of 1959. Features of the home include a basement with finished area, central air conditioning, three fireplaces, and a garage containing .306 square feet of building area. The property has a 20,038 square foot site and is located in Barrington, Cuba Township, Lake County.

The appellants contend overvaluation as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellants submitted information on four comparable sales<sup>1</sup> located from .41 of a mile to 4.7 miles from the subject. The comparables consist of 1.5-story or 2-story dwellings of brick or brick and frame exterior construction ranging in size from 3,213 to 3,898 square feet of living

area. The homes were built from 1974 to 2006, with the oldest home having an effective age of 1984. Each dwelling has central air conditioning, a fireplace, a basement with two having finished area, and a garage ranging in size from 484 to 779 square feet of building area. The parcels range in size from 20,250 to 217,800 square feet of land area. The comparables sold from January 2021 to March 2022 for prices ranging from \$560,000 to \$1,300,000 or from \$158.24 to \$333.50 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the appellants requested a reduced assessment of \$198,154, for an estimated market value of \$594,521 or \$178.00 per square foot of living area, including land, when applying the statutory level of assessment of 33.33%.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$208,405. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$625,278 or \$187.21 per square foot of living area, land included, when applying the statutory level of assessment of 33.33%.<sup>2</sup>

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on three comparable sales located within .11 of a mile of the subject and within the subject's assessment neighborhood. The comparables consist of 1.5-story or 2-story dwellings of frame exterior construction ranging in size from 2,614 to 3,273 square feet of living area. The dwellings were built from 1928 to 1965, with effective ages ranging from 1954 to 1969. Each dwelling has central air conditioning, one to three fireplaces, a basement with one having finished area, and a garage ranging in size from 437 to 860 square feet of building area. The parcels range in size from 15,847 to 24,637 square feet of land area. The comparables sold from November 2021 to February 2023 for prices ranging from \$525,000 to \$750,000 or from \$200.84 to \$240.15 per square foot of living area, including land. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

### **Conclusion of Law**

The appellants contend the market value of the subject property is not accurately reflected in its assessed valuation. When market value is the basis of the appeal the value of the property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence. 86 Ill. Admin. Code §1910.63(e). Proof of market value may consist of an appraisal of the subject property, a recent sale, comparable sales, or construction costs. 86 Ill. Admin. Code §1910.65(c). The Board finds the appellants did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted a total of seven comparable sales to support their respective positions before the Property Tax Appeal Board, with one comparable having sold twice. The Board gives less weight to the appellants' comparables, which differ from the subject in age, location, and/or site size. The Board also gives reduced weight to board of review comparable #2, which sold less proximate to the January 1, 2023 assessment date at issue.

Admin. Code §1910.50(c)(1). Prior to the drafting of this decision, the Department of Revenue has yet to publish figures for tax year 2023.

The Board finds the best evidence of market value to be board of review comparable sales #1 and #3, which sold proximate to the assessment date at issue and are similar to the subject in age, location, and some features. These most similar comparables sold in May 2022 and February 2023 for prices of \$525,000 and \$750,000 or for \$200.84 and \$240.15 per square foot of living area, including land. The subject's assessment reflects a market value of \$625,278 or \$187.21 per square foot of living area, including land, which is bracketed by the best comparable sales in this record overall and below the best comparables on a per-square-foot basis. Based on this evidence and after considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

**IMPORTANT NOTICE**

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
