



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

APPELLANT: Blanche Flosman

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Blanche Flosman, the appellant, by attorney Brian S. Maher of Weis, DuBrock, Doody & Maher in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **no change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$4,347
IMPR.: \$14,653
TOTAL: \$19,000

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2023 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a 1.5-story dwelling of frame exterior construction with 1,260 square feet of living area. The dwelling is approximately 113 years old. The home features a full basement, central air conditioning and one bathroom. The property has a 3,780 square foot site and is located in Cicero, Cicero Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-03 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on four equity comparables that have the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject property. The comparables are class 2-03 properties that are improved with 1-story or 1.5-story dwellings of stucco, frame or masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 1,386 to 1,630 square feet of living area. The dwellings range in age from 101 to 115 years old. One comparable has a

concrete slab foundation and three comparables each have a full basement. Each comparable has one full bathroom and each comparable has from a one-car to a two-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments that range from \$13,653 to \$16,524 or from \$9.74 to \$10.14 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested the subject's improvement assessment be reduced to \$12,461 or \$9.89 per square foot of living area.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$19,000. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$14,653 or \$11.63 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on three equity comparables that have the same assessment neighborhood code as the subject and are located approximately $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile from the subject property, one of which is also along the same street as the subject. The comparables are class 2-03 properties that are improved with 1-story or 1.5-story dwellings of frame or masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 1,008 to 1,224 square feet of living area. The dwellings range in age from 104 to 121 years old. One comparable has a crawl space foundation and two comparables each have a full or partial basement, one of which has finished area. Each comparable has one full bathroom and either a one-car or a two-car garage. Two comparables each have an additional half bathroom. The comparables have improvement assessments of \$14,653 and \$17,668 or from \$11.97 to \$17.53 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted seven comparable properties for the Board's consideration. The Board has given less weight to the appellant's comparables #1, #2, #4, as well as board of review comparable #3 due to differences from the subject dwelling in design or size.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be the appellant's comparable #3 and board of review comparables #1 and #2, which are overall more similar to the subject in dwelling size and design. However, the comparables have varying degrees of similarity when compared to the subject in age, foundation type, bathroom count and garage amenity, suggesting adjustments would be necessary to make them more equivalent to the subject. Nevertheless, the comparables have improvement assessments of \$13,653 and \$14,653 or from \$9.85 to \$12.82 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$14,653 or \$11.63 per square foot of living area is equal to two of the three best comparables in the record in terms of overall improvement assessment and falls at the lower end of the range on a per square foot of

living area basis. After considering adjustments to the best comparables for differences from the subject, the Board finds the subject's improvement assessment is supported. Therefore, based on this record the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
