



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Eva A. Panocha, the appellant, by attorney Michael Mazek, of Mazek Law Group LLC in Chicago; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$16,800
IMPR.: \$28,200
TOTAL: \$45,000

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2023 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a 2-story dwelling of frame and masonry exterior construction with 1,888 square feet of living area. The dwelling is approximately 118 years old. Features of the home include a basement, central air conditioning, and a 2-car garage. The property has a 4,800 square foot site and is located in Chicago, Jefferson Township, Cook County and is classified as a class 2-05 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the subject's improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument the appellant submitted information on three comparable properties located within the subject's assessment neighborhood and within 0.20 of a mile or 1.4 miles from the subject property. The comparables are improved with class 2-05, 2-story dwellings of frame exterior construction ranging in size from 998 to 1,590 square feet of

living area. The dwellings are from 114 to 135 years old. Each comparable has a basement, central air conditioning, and a 2-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$11,600 to \$23,060 or from \$9.71 to \$14.50 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence the appellant requested a reduction in the subject's improvement assessment.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject property of \$45,000. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$28,200 or \$14.94 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment the board of review submitted information on four comparable properties located within the subject's assessment neighborhood and within approximately ¼ of a mile from the subject. The comparables are improved with class 2-05, 2-story dwellings of frame or frame and masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 1,578 or 2,119 square feet of living area. The dwellings are from 99 to 113 years old. Each comparable has a basement and either a 2-car or a 2.5-car garage. Two comparables each have central air conditioning. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$29,625 to \$37,345 or from \$15.51 to \$19.16 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the board of review requested confirmation of the subject's assessment.

Conclusion of Law

The taxpayer contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties provided a total of seven equity comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables for differences in their location or dwelling size when compared to the subject. The Board also gives less weight to the board of review's comparables #2 and #3 due to the differences in their newer ages when compared to the subject.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be the board of review's comparables #1 and #4 which are overall most similar to the subject in location, age, dwelling size, foundation type and some features. These two comparables have improvement assessments of \$29,625 and \$34,788 or \$17.15 and \$18.77 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$28,200 or \$14.94 per square foot of living area falls below the improvement assessments of the two best comparables in this record. After considering adjustments to the two best comparables for differences from the subject, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
