



**FINAL ADMINISTRATIVE DECISION
ILLINOIS PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD**

The parties of record before the Property Tax Appeal Board are Saulius Paskauskas, the appellant, by attorney George N. Reveliotis, of Reveliotis Law, P.C. in Park Ridge; and the Cook County Board of Review.

Based on the facts and exhibits presented in this matter, the Property Tax Appeal Board hereby finds **No Change** in the assessment of the property as established by the **Cook** County Board of Review is warranted. The correct assessed valuation of the property is:

LAND: \$8,918
IMPR.: \$28,252
TOTAL: \$37,170

Subject only to the State multiplier as applicable.

Statement of Jurisdiction

The appellant timely filed the appeal from a decision of the Cook County Board of Review pursuant to section 16-160 of the Property Tax Code (35 ILCS 200/16-160) challenging the assessment for the 2023 tax year. The Property Tax Appeal Board finds that it has jurisdiction over the parties and the subject matter of the appeal.

Findings of Fact

The subject property consists of a 1.5-story dwelling of frame exterior construction with 2,295 square feet of living area. The dwelling is approximately 85 years old. Features include a partial basement, 2 full bathrooms, 2 fireplaces, central air conditioning, and a 2-car garage. The property has a 14,270 square foot site and is located in Palos Heights, Worth Township, Cook County. The subject is classified as a class 2-04 property under the Cook County Real Property Assessment Classification Ordinance.

The appellant contends assessment inequity with respect to the improvement as the basis of the appeal. In support of this argument, the appellant submitted information on seven equity comparables located within the subject's assessment neighborhood. The comparables are improved with 1-story, class 2-04 dwellings of frame, masonry, or frame and masonry exterior construction ranging in size from 1,863 to 3,048 square feet of living area. The homes range in

age from 59 to 73 years old. Two comparables each have a partial basement and five comparables each have a slab or crawl space foundation. Each comparable has from 1 to 3½ bathrooms and 1 or 2 fireplaces. Three comparables each have central air conditioning. Five comparables each have from a 1-car to a 2-car garage. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$20,512 to \$29,801 or from \$9.78 to \$11.66 per square foot of living area. Based on this evidence, the appellant requested that the improvement assessment be reduced.

The board of review submitted its "Board of Review Notes on Appeal" disclosing the total assessment for the subject of \$37,170. The subject property has an improvement assessment of \$28,252 or \$12.31 per square foot of living area.

In support of its contention of the correct assessment, the board of review submitted information on four equity comparables located within the subject's assessment neighborhood. The comparables are improved with 1.5-story, class 2-04 dwellings of frame exterior construction ranging in size from 1,809 to 2,066 square feet of living area. The homes range in age from 68 to 87 years old. Each comparable has a full or partial basement, one of which has finished area, 1 or 1½ bathrooms, and from a 1-car to a 2.5-car garage. Three comparables each have central air conditioning. Two comparables each have 1 fireplace. The comparables have improvement assessments ranging from \$24,000 to \$26,000 or from \$12.58 to \$13.57 per square foot of living area.

Conclusion of Law

The appellant contends assessment inequity as the basis of the appeal. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of the appeal, the inequity of the assessments must be proved by clear and convincing evidence. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.63(e). Proof of unequal treatment in the assessment process should consist of documentation of the assessments for the assessment year in question of not less than three comparable properties showing the similarity, proximity and lack of distinguishing characteristics of the assessment comparables to the subject property. 86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.65(b). The Board finds the appellant did not meet this burden of proof and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not warranted.

The parties submitted 11 suggested comparables for the Board's consideration. The Board gives less weight to the appellant's comparables, as well as board of review comparables #2 and #4, due to differences from the subject in design, age, dwelling size, foundation type, central air conditioning, and/or garage amenity.

The Board finds the best evidence of assessment equity to be board of review comparables #1 and #3 which are overall most similar to the in location, design/class, age, and dwelling size with varying degrees of similarity in other features. Each of the comparables is a smaller home than the subject, as well as having have fewer bathrooms and fireplaces than the subject, suggesting upward adjustments would be appropriate to make them more equivalent to the subject. Conversely, board of review comparable #1 has a larger garage capacity suggesting a downward adjustment for this difference may be appropriate for equivalency with the subject. The two best comparables have improvement assessments of \$25,219 and \$26,000 or \$12.58 and \$13.57 per square foot of living area. The subject's improvement assessment of \$28,252 or \$12.31 per

square foot of living area falls above the two best comparables in this record on an overall improvement assessment basis and below them on a per square foot basis. The subject's assessment is logical considering its superior features, as described above, and the accepted real estate principle of the economies of scale. After considering adjustments to the two best comparables for differences when compared to the subject, the Board finds the appellant did not demonstrate with clear and convincing evidence that the subject's improvement was inequitably assessed and a reduction in the subject's assessment is not justified.

This is a final administrative decision of the Property Tax Appeal Board which is subject to review in the Circuit Court or Appellate Court under the provisions of the Administrative Review Law (735 ILCS 5/3-101 et seq.) and section 16-195 of the Property Tax Code. Pursuant to Section 1910.50(d) of the rules of the Property Tax Appeal Board (86 Ill.Admin.Code §1910.50(d)) the proceeding before the Property Tax Appeal Board is terminated when the decision is rendered. The Property Tax Appeal Board does not require any motion or request for reconsideration.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

Section 16-185 of the Property Tax Code provides in part:

"If the Property Tax Appeal Board renders a decision lowering the assessment of a particular parcel after the deadline for filing complaints with the Board of Review or after adjournment of the session of the Board of Review at which assessments for the subsequent year or years of the same general assessment period, as provided in Sections 9-125 through 9-225, are being considered, the taxpayer may, within 30 days after the date of written notice of the Property Tax Appeal Board's decision, appeal the assessment for such subsequent year or years directly to the Property Tax Appeal Board."

In order to comply with the above provision, YOU MUST FILE A PETITION AND EVIDENCE WITH THE PROPERTY TAX APPEAL BOARD WITHIN 30 DAYS OF THE DATE OF THE ENCLOSED DECISION IN ORDER TO APPEAL THE ASSESSMENT OF THE PROPERTY FOR THE SUBSEQUENT YEAR OR YEARS. A separate petition and evidence must be filed for each of the remaining years of the general assessment period.

Based upon the issuance of a lowered assessment by the Property Tax Appeal Board, the refund of paid property taxes is the responsibility of your County Treasurer. Please contact that office with any questions you may have regarding the refund of paid property taxes.
